Exploring career options at Specialized Occupation Fair

A two-day Specialized Occupation Fair was recently held at Garrison Petawawa to increase awareness and streamline the process for members interested in learning about specialty occupations in the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF).

Information booths staffed by recruiters from Canadian Special Operations Forces Command (CANSOF-COM), Clearance Diver, Close Protection, Conduct After Capture (CAC/ CACI), Cyber Ops, JTF-X, Flight Engineer, Personnel Support Programs (PSP) and Search and Rescue Technician (SAR-Tech) specialties, were set up in Dundonald Hall on March 6 and 7, providing details on these trades as well as answering any questions members might have about a new career path. Briefings were also held throughout the event.

"We wanted to highlight the diverse opportunities the Canadian Armed Forces has to offer," said Base Personnel Selection Officer and Event Coordinator Second Lieutenant (2Lt) Cole Keaney.

For most of these occupations, individuals have to be in the CAF prior to applying and by getting to know the requirements for a position, interested personnel can work towards reaching these goals, she pointed out.

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Pop Up Art Renfrew County venues include Grn Petawawa's Dundonald Hall

Pop Up Art will pop up at six venues this summer, including private businesses and public facilities. The venues were selected based on specific criteria which included geographical location, high foot traffic, space allowance and accessibility. Prefence was given to locations where people tend to linger or wait and which serve a broad crosssection of the community. Organizers also considered the element of surprise-many locations are not your typical art gallery location.

The selected six locations are: the Fifth Chute Café in Eganville, May 2 to 19 (also the official launch event); Dundonald Hall Fitness Sports and Aquatic Centre, Garrison Petawawa, May 23 to June 9; Arnprior Public Library, June 13 to 30; Deep River and District Hospital, July 4 to 21; Madawaska Coffee in Barry's Bay, July 25 to August 11; and Renfrew Visitor Information Centre, August 15 to September 1. Mark your calendar for the location closest to you.

Karen DeLuca of the Arnprior Library noted, "The books-only, quiet libraries of yesteryear have become dynamic community hubs and to that end, we're thrilled to be partnering with Ottawa Valley Creative Arts Open Studio to bring Pop Up Art to Arnprior. Hundreds of people walk through our doors every day. We're excited to add an interactive art exhibit to a library experience."

Pop Up Art features an exhibit titled Extra-Ordinary which explores how ordinary objects can take on a larger meaning in our lives. The exhibit includes eleven artists - each has chosen an object as a source of inspiration for their developing art pieces. Objects include a tree, a pot, a piece of driftwood, a pie, a saw blade, a green glass bottle, a birchbark purse, a pitcher, a plow tip, the piano at Festival Hall and a honeybee comb. The objects are representative of a story surrounding the artists' experiences living in Renfrew County.

Some of the stories include how a veteran uses art to heal and live with posttraumatic stress disorder;

moving to an old farm in the Valley and discovering remnants from the past; connecting to music in the Valley; looking at the forestry industry today and a hundred years ago; and how moose meat pie ties a community together. Eight different types of media are represented in the art pieces, including found objects, film, ceramic, painting, mosaic, blacksmithing, glass and textiles.

The official launch for Pop Up Art is taking place at the Fifth Chute Café in Eganville on Thursday May 2, from 7 to 9 p.m. Everyone is welcome for this grand opening celebration.



Čanada continues to provide a broad range of assistance (development, financial, humanitarian, nonlethal military) to Ukraine, totaling more than \$750 million since January 2014.

Under Operation UNIFI-ER, Canada deploys approximately 200 CAF personnel to Ukraine.

Since the start of the training in September 2015, the CAF has trained more than 10,800 Ukrainian service members to be selfsufficient in their training delivery and in the conduct of military operations.

On March 15, 2019, Canada announced, in coordination with the European Union and the United States, new sanctions in response to Russia's aggressive actions in the Black Sea and Kerch Strait, Russia's illegal annexation of Crimea and to the destabilization of eastern Ukraine.

From July 2 to 4, 2019, Canada will host the third Ukraine Reform Conference in Toronto. The conference will bring together, among others, foreign ministers from the European Union, the G7 and NATO countries to support Ukraine and its people, in meeting their ambitious democratic and economic reform programme and Euro-Atlantic goals.

When snow falls in such large quantities we begin to worry about the safety and comfort of our homes. We rely on them to protect us from harsh weather conditions, and the furnace plays a key role in this protection. However, the snow can interfere with the furnace and create a hazard or at least some discomfort if you do not take the proper steps to prevent this from happening.

CARBON MONOXIDE

Carbon monoxide is a gas. You cannot see it, taste it, or smell it. It is created when fuels do not burn completely. Kerosene, gasoline, coal, natural gas, propane, and wood are examples of fuels. Carbon monoxide can make vou verv sick or kill you. You need a carbon monoxide alarm on each level of vour home. If you hear the carbon monoxide alarm, get outside the home right away. Call for help from outside.

CLEAR AWAY THE SNOW

After heavy snowfall, be sure to check the PVC pipe religiously.

International Day of Forests (March 21) and World Water Day (March 22)

International Day of Forests and World Water Day are both observed annually by all UN member states.

International Day of Forests is held annually on the 21st of March. It highlights the importance of forests to people everywhere. Locally and globally people depend on forests for their livelihoods, medicine, fuel and food.

Canada has nearly nine per cent of the world's forest with over 347 million hectares. [Natural Resources Canada, Feb. 15, 2017] A collaborative arrangement was made between the provincial, territorial and federal governments as well as the forest industry to ensure that forest monitoring and evidence-based sustainable practices are used. [Natural Resources Canada, Feb. 15, 2017]

Locally Petawawa is home to one of two national research forests. The Petawawa research forest was established in 1918 and encompasses a 10,000 hectare area. [Natural Resource Canada, Sept. 11, 2015] The Petawawa research forest has many important studies both short and long term, some of which have been underway for decades. The purpose of these studies is to promote sustainable forestry within Canada

World Water Day began in 1993 with the United Nations General Assembly officially designated March 22nd as the day to refocus our attention on the importance of freshwater and the sustainability of global water resources.

As Canadians it is sometimes difficult to understand the problems that plague the globe with regards to accessibility of clean water. According to the World Health Organization 2.1 billion people live without safe water at home. It is estimated by the year 2025 close to 1.8 billion people will be living in regions with absolute water scarcity. [UN Water, 2010]

Each year the UN Water group proposes a theme to focuses on and this year's theme is 'Leaving no one behind'. This theme is based on an adaptation of the 2030 goal of sustainable development. The main focus of this goal is to provide clean water and a sustainable water management plan for all by 2030. Alongside the UN many non-governmental organizations have used this day to focus attention on the many issues affecting water globally.

Nutrition changes are on the horizon!

March is Nutrition Month? The Nutrition Month 2019 campaign is dedicated to helping Canadians realize



the potential of food to fuel, discover, prevent, heal and bring us together.

Within the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF), healthy choices are always available on the National Standardized Cycle Menu (NSCM) offered at CAF dining facilities. New nutrition education materials have been developed. You can find them posted at CAF dining facilities.

Since the launch of Health Canada's Healthy Eating Strategy in late 2016, the Government of Canada has been taking action to

make the healthier choice the easier choice for all Canadians. Many changes have already taken place when it comes to promoting nutrition:

• We have seen the ban of partially hydrogenated oils (the main source of industrially produced trans fats in foods) as of September 17, 2018.

• Food label regulations were updated at the end of 2016 (although manufacturers have until 2021 to comply).

•The most recent change was the launch of the new Food Guide on January 22, 2019.

Canada's new food guide takes a modern approach to communicating dietary guidance to consumers, health professionals and policy makers. Some of the changes include modern visuals, a more user-focused approach with an online suite of resources including a mobile-friendly web application, renewed terminology, and, perhaps most importantly, the new guide reflects the best of the latest evidence on food and health.

So how is the latest evidence reflected in the new guide? The healthy meal plate now consists of: ½ vegetables and fruit, ¼ whole grains and ¼ protein foods (milk and alternatives and meat and alternatives are now grouped together as protein foods).

Among protein foods, plant-based should be consumed more often. Water is now the beverage of choice

and sugary drinks, including 100% juice and sweetened milk, are not recommended to be consumed regularly.

What's exciting is that there are even more changes on the horizon. Later this year, Health Canada is expected to release Canada's Healthy Eating Pattern which will provide guidance on the amounts and types of food that make up a healthy diet.

the frigid waters for the 2019 Polar Bear Dip. It wasn't surprising that this was an oft-repeated re-

frain when considering that Heather Jobe, Community Development Coordinator for the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (Ontario SCPA) Renfrew County Animal Centre, has often been described as a force of

nature when it comes to raising money to help animals.

She managed to lure 31 registered jumpers to the icy shores of the Catwalk at the Centennial Park, many of whom collected pledges for the opportunity to freeze their proverbial paws off. Many more spectators gathered to watch these brave souls plunge into the freezing water on March 3.

"It's amazing," said Jobe. "Just look at everybody here. I'm not surprised there are so many people because people love animals."

Jobe led the plunge, willingly, and with very little hesitation, jumping first into the water.

Though like many she came up sputtering and desperately cold, she knew that the pain was all worthwhile as the event had raised \$4,500 with more still coming in. This far surpassed the original goal of \$2,100.

"We love animals and these animals need our help," said Jobe. "The animals depend on us and anything we can do, even if it seems a little extreme, to raise some money to help...is worth it in the end," she added.

Safety was paramount as the event isn't without its risks. Firefighters were on the scene to help the plungers get in and out of the water without incident and at all times, a heavily equipped firefighter was in the water to ensure that no one slipped under the ice.

"In the suit, it's very comfortable and without, it's not pleasant," said President of the Firefighters Associa-

tion Peter Moss. "Though I wouldn't know since I've never been in the water without a suit on."

He did appreciate the chance to watch - and maybe laugh a little - at the participants as they grimaced and hollered throughout the dip.

Originally postponed due to dangerously cold weather, the event was part of the 2018 Cabin Fever lineup. To keep it alive, organizers had to move it to a warmer day. This setback actually turned out to be a good thing as the event attracted more donations and there was less threat of frostbite or hypothermia.

The Polar Bear Dip tradi-

tionally benefited a different charity every year, but the Ontario SPCA has decided to take on the Polar Bear Dip as part of their roster of fundraisers. This event is now a smaller part of their National Cupcake Day Fundraiser.

The money raised from the Polar Bear Dip will go towards the care and maintenance of the animals at the shelter.

Jobe was grateful to all the jumpers and their supporters as well as to the Town of Petawawa who helped them organize the event, and Dominos Pizza Petawawa as they donated nine extra-large pizzas for the plungers.

Receiving a barrage of phone calls in a few short hours is rarely a positive thing, unless it's calls to the 2nd annual Pembroke Regional Hos-

pital Foundation (PRHF) Care to Connect Radiothon.

With the help of local radion station MyFM, the PRHF had hundreds of people in the community call in with donations for their Cutting Edge Campaign.

This ongoing campaign supports a regional orthopedic program and modernizes the surgical floor within the hospital, both of which are costly endeavours. To bridge the gap in government funding, the hospital has to raise

\$2.5 million of the \$11.5 million project price tag.

We see the homestretch coming," said Radiothon emcee Art Jamieson, pointing out that \$800,000 remains.

Holding a radiothon on March 2, headquartered at the Pembroke Mall, brought the PRHF that much closer to its goal.

"It's a way for the foundation and our hospital family to reach out to our community family in hopes of garnering support for the needs we have at our regional hospital," said PRHF Executive Director

Nancy Warren. "No donation is too small, we all pull together as a community and that's how we reach our goals."

Last year, the radiothon raised \$44,000.

With a basket raffle still ongoing until March 28, the total raised hasn't been released. However, organizers have calculated that over \$41,000 was collected during the event.

"Whatever we get is great, appreciated and much needed," said Warren.

While 50 volunteers rotated shifts on the telephones,

many more helped out at booths and entertained passersby with live music. It is only through the help of volunteers, donors, sponsors and individuals that the event was very successful - something for which Warren is enternally grateful.

"It's really heartwarming to see our community pull to-gether for healthcare," she said.






