Dear CCMS: Raising the issue

Q: I'm constantly being interrupted by the same person at our meetings. I'm not sure what my colleague has against me, but it's causing me to feel like I'm not contributing anything of value. What can I do?

A: Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) doesn't only happen within the Conflict and Complaint Management Service (CCMS) office. There is a great opportunity

for anyone to participate in ADR through one-on-one conversations. This approach is early, local and informal (ELI) and helps nip conflict in the bud. Should you choose to address this situation directly with your colleague, here is a three-step approach for raising the issue and setting a time to have the conversation.

Step 1. State the situation as you see it, focusing on the

problem (not the person), using a neutral non-accusatory tone and words.

Example: I've noticed we've had trouble communicating during meetings and there isn't always an opportunity to finish sharing our thoughts.

Step 2. Explain why it is important for you to have this discussion.

Example: It's important for us to talk about this so that we are able to fully express ourselves in meetings, which can lead to a stronger team.

Step 3. Seek agreement on the issues and invite the other person to work with you to resolve them.

Example: Do you agree that there is a benefit to talking about this? We can take some time this afternoon if you are available.

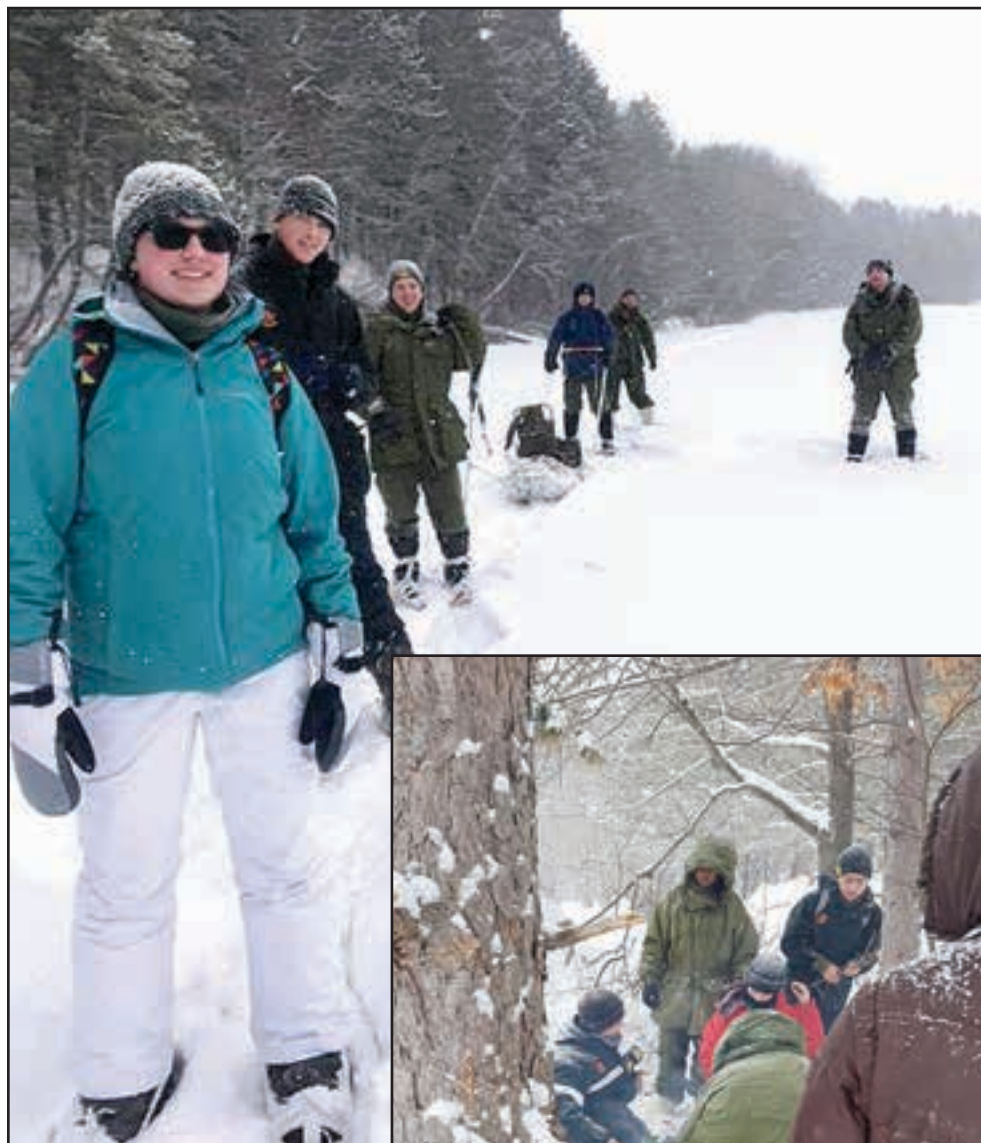

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY- MARCH 8

Each year, March 8 is an opportunity to celebrate the contributions of women and renew our efforts in achieving gender equality – in Canada and around the world.

The beginnings of International Women's Day (IWD) trace back to the early twentieth century, emerging from the activities of labour movements in North America and Europe and reflecting a growing movement for women to participate equally in society.

The first International Women's Day was observed on March 19, 1911 in Austria, Denmark, Germany and Switzerland. That day, more than one million women and men showed their support by

participating in public events. In the years that followed, other countries began to observe and celebrate this day.

The United Nations recognized 1975 as International Women's Year and began celebrating IWD on March 8, later adopting a resolution designating March 8 as International Women's Day.

Today, International Women's Day is celebrated around the world – in many countries, it is a national holiday. It has grown to become a global day of recognition of women's achievements and a call to action to support women's rights and advance gender equality.

Homelessness in Renfrew County isn't as obvious or visible as it often is in larger urban centres - it's not necessarily people living and sleeping on the streets.

Homelessness in the area is much more insidious, quiet

and pervasive. It is a teenager running from an abusive home, an adult working two jobs but still unable to pay rent who lives in their car, or an injured veteran jumping from one friend's couch to another.

Regardless of what shape it takes, it is a problem in the county.

To help those facing home-

lessness and shine a spotlight on the issue, about 170 people came out on Feb. 23 and participated in the Coldest Night of the Year (CNOY) Pembroke fundraising walk. Hosting this annual event was made possible through countless business supporters and individual donors as well as more than 70 volunteers.

Seeing so many people willing to help those in need filled organizers with gratitude.

"I think this is a testament to the issue that we are trying to raise money for, which is homelessness," said David Studham, Chairman for the CNOY Pembroke Steering Committee.

HOW DO I WRITE A CONDOLENCE LETTER?

Condolence letters can provide great comfort to those who have experienced the death of a loved one. At the very least, they affirm that you have acknowledged their loss and know that it was significant. More often, they are written to let the bereaved know that you care about them. We have heard many times how important these cards are to grieving people, and they are often reread over time becoming a part of one's grief experience.

Here are seven components you may want to consider when preparing your letter:

- Acknowledge the loss and refer to their loved one by name.
- Express your sympathy.
- Note any special qualities of their loved one that come to mind.
- Include your favorite memory.

- Remind the bereaved of their personal strengths or special qualities.
- Offer help, but make sure it is a specific offer. Instead of "Let me know if I can help with anything at all," perhaps include a thought such as "I know that Phil took you to church every Sunday. I'd be glad to do that for you."
- End the letter with a thoughtful word, a hope, a wish, or expression of sympathy e.g. "You are in my thoughts" or "Wishing you God's peace." Closings such as "Sincerely," "Love," or "Fondly," are not quite as personal.

On a final note, remember as long as your sentiment is heartfelt and consoling it will be warmly received. Letting the bereaved know that you are there to support them in any way they require will give them comfort and help them through their difficult time.

Choosing between two, five or 10 kms, these kind souls started their trek at the Pembroke Armoury and experienced a small taste of what it is like to have to deal with the cold when there is no shelter.

As well as a chance to

raise awareness on the subject, the event also acted as a fundraiser.

The initial numbers were \$35,000; the hope was that the event would raise \$50,000, but that goal was not achieved on the evening of the walk.

Members of the CNOY Steering Committee are confident, however, that as more money trickles in, they will reach their target. By the time the walk began, not every participant had brought in their promised pledges and many of the corporate

sponsorships were still coming in slowly.

Once all is tallied, the funds should climb much higher, said Studham.

"Our goal was \$50,000 and while we may not make it... I think this is a very generous turnout both in terms of participation with the walkers and volunteers and also with a very generous community. We have over 500 donors," he said.

The raised funds will be donated to The Grind Pembroke and Renfrew County Safe Shelter for Youth, sponsored by Family and Children's Services of Renfrew County (FCSRC).

"This event is so important to us downtown for the

work that we are doing," said Jerry Novack, Executive Director of The Grind. "It is just so encouraging to see so many people come out again this year."

Both organizations are crucial to helping people find stability when they

need a hand up.

During 2017-2018, FC-SRC housed 40 homeless youth and helped many more who were at risk of becoming homeless.

During the same period of time, The Grind housed 157 adults.

Forget Plastic Bottled Water - Think Reusable

There are many benefits to choosing a reusable bottle over plastic bottled water. Many people do not realize that bottled water is not any healthier or cleaner than tap water.

In Canada, tap water is regulated by Health Canada, which has guidelines for the maximum levels of harmful substances that are allowed.

Municipalities have organizations that are continu-

ally checking the quality of the water distributed to their residences.

Bottled water is not subject to the same guidelines because it is considered a food; therefore, falls under the Food and Drugs Act.

Due to the different guidelines, bottled water is not subjected to the same number of checks that tap water is. Some bottled water is actually tap water that may or may not have been run

through a filtration system.

There is a monetary cost as well as an environmental cost to bottled water.

Bottled water can cost from one dollar to upwards of four dollars. When you compare this to mere tenths of a cent per litre for tap water, it makes sense to minimize your bottled water consumption.

People are typically paying 200-3,000 times more to purchase bottled water when compared to what they spend on tap water [The Council of Canadians, 2014].

One of the environmental impacts of bottled water is the massive amounts of fossil fuels that are required to manufacture and transport the product.

Another impact is the space that they take up in landfills, as many bottles do not make it to recycling facilities. One plastic bottle can take hundreds of years to decompose adding further to

the landfill problems.

In an effort to help decrease the consumption of disposable plastic bottles Garrison Petawawa has begun to install the Elkay ezH2O bottle filling stations (shown in photo).

The station is very efficient and fills a sixteen ounce bottle in approximately five seconds.

It works with a sensor that automatically turns on when a bottle is set under the spigot.

It is equipped with an automatic sensor that will shut off the stream after twenty seconds if someone fails to remove a bottle.

There is a filter is capable of removing particulate, chlorine, odour and lead and also has a graphic display that shows how many plastic water bottles have been saved.

Currently in March of 2019, over 250,000 bottles have been saved in Garrison Petawawa through the use of these filling stations.

ANTICIPATING A SOGGY SPRING

After a snowier winter, it is the responsibility of all residents of Garrison Petawawa to get an early start to safeguard your residences from potential spring flooding.

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO MITIGATE THE POSSIBILITY OF FLOODING THIS SPRING?

To try and prevent water getting into your homes try the following:

- Keep your window wells clean of snow, ice and debris;
- Clear a path from your window wells so the water can move freely away from your residence;
- Ensure the down spouts are free from debris and positioned in a manner that will allow water to run freely away from your residence; and
- Shovel a small path down your driveway to assist melting snow and ice in the direction of the street/storm drains.

WHAT CAN I DO TO KEEP MY BASEMENT AND THE ARTICLES I STORE THERE DRY?

- Keep articles and boxes off the floor using pallets;
- Ensure your floor drains are free of debris and accessible;
- Purchase of a wet/dry vacuum for smaller clean-up jobs in case of water infiltration; and
- Know where the storm drains are in proximity to your residence and try to keep them clear. There will be crews going around the Residential Housing Units (RHUs) to keep them open for melting snow and ice.

It is advisable to know what your insurance coverage is in the event of water ingress or damage to personal property.

In the case an RHU resident requires assistance, call:

During afterhours/emergency, please contact the Duty Officer 613-687-5511 ext. 5457 or 613-639-1356.

By taking steps to keep melting snow and ice

away from your foundation it is less likely a rapid spring melt will affect your home.

2nd Ethan Allard Memorial Tourney raises \$24,000

Generosity and kindness are what marked Ethan Allard's life - that and hockey.

His philosophy, "You never get poor by giving" was evident in every aspect of his life, and the love he felt for all those around him was rivalled only by his love of hockey and helping others, particularly children.

He was a man who spread joy to others and will be remembered for that, despite his life having been cut tragically short.

Ethan died in 2017, a 24-year-old victim of a workplace accident at a construction site in Toronto's Beaches neighbourhood. He left behind 12 siblings, parents, nieces and nephews, his teammates and countless friends.

Yet from this pain, his memory continues to be honoured. His spirit was clearly present during the 2nd Annual Ethan Allard Memorial Hockey Tournament, a three-day event that collects funds for Canadian Tire's Jumpstart.

The tournament was created to merge two of Ethan's greatest passions: hockey and helping children. It does so successfully and has raised a total of \$24,000 this year to help the program, double what was made last year.

"It is amazing," said Ethan's father Shane Allard. "It isn't our money, it is the community's money and without them, this wouldn't happen. The support that we got is incredible."

Jumpstart helps children in need in Renfrew County play the sports they love but would otherwise be unable to participate in.

The support the family has received has been tremendous. People from far and wide, some not even connected to Ethan or the Allard family, have been digging deep to help out.

"It's going to be helping a lot of kids," said Ethan's

brother Tyson Allard. "Just the cost alone for sports, any sports, in this day and age is so expensive so we've got to give back and help out."

Petawawa Minor Hockey also waived the registration fee for one player inspired by Ethan's legacy of generosity.

"They've done that personally without Jumpstart getting involved," said Cole Allard, one of Ethan's other brothers. "It's going to a good cause helping a kid be able to play the game."

Sixteen teams registered, which included four newly added women's teams.

Though there was a competitive aspect to the tournament, it was mostly for fun, something the family knows Ethan appreciated while he watched over them from above.

"He definitely had a few laughs this weekend," said Tyson. "This year had something different about it. I had more smiles than anything."

The winner of the Women's Division was Pik Fuels while the Petawawa Redskins won the Open Division. The Rec A Division Champions were Team USA and the Rec B Division winners were the Chiz N the Boys team.
