

A hair-razing experience: fundraiser brings in \$1,873 for Cdn Cancer Society

Corporal Allie Whalen raises almost \$2,000 in honour of her grandfather, who is currently battling cancer; husband joins in with his own close shave.

Corporal (Cpl) Allie Whalen loved her long hair but was willing to sacrifice it all to raise \$1,873 for the Canadian Cancer Society.

She announced her plan to shave her head for charity online and within minutes, money began pouring in from friends, families, community members and coworkers.

"I am very humbled by all the support," said Allie, pointing out the total amount far

surpassed her original goal of raising \$250. Her husband, Master Warrant Officer (MWO) Jason Whalen, even offered to shave his own head and beard if she reached \$500. It is a great sacrifice as he had waited 20 years to grow one, said Allie jokingly.

Within that day, however, the money climbed far above \$500, and his beard was on the chopping block.

"I don't mind, it is for a good cause," said Jason. "It's only hair. People who are going through chemo, they don't have the choice. But I do and mine will grow back. So it is a show of solidarity."

When the day came on June 11, after a little under two weeks of fundraising, Allie set up a makeshift salon in her front yard under a tree, both anxious and excited to proceed. A small crowd of people gathered at a safe distance to watch it happen, and those who couldn't make it in person watched online. Before cutting her hair, she decided to

dye it bright pink in honour of her greatgrandmother, who died of breast cancer.

Her great-grandmother isn't the only one in the family who has been affected by cancer. Her uncle died of testicular cancer, and her grandfather - who inspired her fundraiser - is currently battling a very aggressive type of small cell cancer.

"He lives seven hours away so I can't be there to support him," said Allie. "So this seems like a good thing I could do for him from afar. And he's pretty excited for me. He's been following this pretty closely."

She admits she's surprised so many people are so enthusiastic about her hair, or lack thereof, but whatever helps her raise money to fight against this deadly disease is good in her books.

"I feel like this is one of those fundraisers that hit close to home for everyone," said Allie. "Everybody either has known someone in their immediate family or friends who had it."

According to the Canadian Cancer Society, on average, 617 Canadians are diagnosed with cancer and 228 Canadians die as a result of the disease each day. Nearly one in two Canadians (45 per cent of men and 43 per cent of women) is expected to develop cancer during their lifetime.

But with advanced research and treatment many of these cancers have a good prognosis, with some seeing more than 90 percent five-year survivability rate.

I don't feel comfortable talking with my colleagues. They are constantly criticizing leadership and bickering with each other. I think my workplace is toxic and I don't know what to do about it.

A high percentage of the conflicts and complaints we support at Conflict and Complaint Management Services (CCMS) have to do with communication; or lack thereof. It doesn't take much to create conflict between employees: a joke made in bad taste, a criticism or comment directed at a person or a group, or a simple misinterpretation of body language that sends the wrong message.

When you consider we spend an average of 90,000 hours at work in our lifetime, it is important that our workplace supports our physical, mental, and psychosocial where we can cultivate professional relationships and communicate effectively and respectfully with each other.

If you are having difficulty interacting with your colleagues for whatever reason, contact one of our CCMS Agents. A CCMS Agent can provide relevant information that is aimed to assist you with deciding how to address the situation. They can also be a referral agent to your chosen support resource. One such resource may be one of our Conflict Management Practitioners.

Another option you might consider is to participate in one or more of the communication skills courses or workshops we offer, including Resolving Conflict Effectively, Conflict Management for Leaders, or

ROAD CLOSURES ON FESTUBERT BLVD BETWEEN 21 JUNE AND 26 NOV 2021 DETOURS WILL BE IN EFFECT

GARRISON PETAWAWA - Sections of Festubert Boulevard will be closed between the end of June until the end of November, 2021 in order to upgrade utilities and reconstruct the road.

AS REQUIRED

The construction will be done in phases beginning towards the Petawawa Golf Club and making its way towards the main intersection at Petawawa Boulevard.

Once construction occurs on Festubert Blvd towards the main intersection, all commuters will need to enter through the main gate. Through traffic will be redirected via the main gate onto Somme Road. Traffic will then be redirected onto Peacekeeper Way and then merge back onto Festubert Boulevard on the other side of road closure. Local traffic to the residential housing units (RHUs) will be directed onto accompanying side streets as required to avoid construction.

All commuters accessing Dundonald Hall (DDH), the Silver Dart Arena, Troyes Cinema, the Canex Plaza, the Petawawa Golf Club/Twin Rivers, the Army Fitness Centre, Tim Horton's, the RecPlex, Black Bear Beach & Campground, Jubilee Lodge & Marina and St. Francis of Assisi Church will not be denied, only rerouted via the detour and are encouraged to avoid residential areas.



Capacity Building at the Logistics Commission, Ramallah

As the only permanent Training Development Officer (TDO) within the United States Security Coordinator (USSC), I have been assigned the unique responsibility of assisting the Palestinian Authority Security Forces (PASF) in the development/

expansion of their training system. The USSC approach to supporting PASF training has evolved from providing tactical-level training to focusing more on capacity building and sustainability such that the PASF could eventually develop training programs independently that are pedagogically sound and built upon a clearly defined training requirement. Such is the work currently underway at the Logistics Commission (LC) in Ramallah.

The LC is an organization charged with providing logistical support and leadership on logistics issues across the PASF. As the Centre of Excellence (COE) for Logistics services and training, the LC up until recently was more a consumer of training, not a producer, but this is chang-

ing. By partnering with our international colleagues, doctrinal elements of a training system were socialized within the LC that will be applied locally but are consistent with doctrinal direction that the PASF is being encouraged $\,$ to adopt. This system includes training development activities fashioned after the ADDIE industry standard quality control model. AD-DIE being the acronym for: Analysis, Design, Development, Implementation, and Evaluation.

In coordination with the LC, a requirement for Safe Food Handling training was identified. However, with the USSC's movement away from tactical-level support to capacity building and sustainability, developing a Food Safety training program

without integrating the training development skills into the LC would be inconsistent with the USSC approach.

Rather, food safety was used as a vehicle by which to integrate broad-reaching capability including providing key members of the LC with skills in task analysis and training design that would give them the ability to participate in qualification standard and training plan writing boards leading to the production of training control documents that the Training Development Officer Branch is familiar. Graduates from this course were now in the position to support the development of training for the Food Safety course spoken of earlier.

A Message from the Fire Prevention Branch: Barbecue grills

1. Propane, charcoal, and wood pellet barbecue grills must only be used outdoors. Indoor use can kill occupants by causing a fire or carbon monoxide poisoning.

2. Place the grill well away from siding and deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches according to the manufacturer's instructions. Do not store or use a grill on a porch or balcony, including any porch or balcony on an upper level of the building.

3. Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas, and foot traffic.

4. Keep children and pets away from the grill area. Have a three-foot (one metre) "kid-free zone" around the grill.

5. Use long-handled grilling tools for plenty of clearance from heat and flames when cooking.6. Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in the

6. Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in the tray(s) below the grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.

7. Safe use of barbecue and storage of propane cylinder. (ensure three m clearance from home and combustibles).



Barbecues

- Do not use this appliance beside or in your home or garage.
- Do not use within 3 meters of any structure.
- Use in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- Don't leave this appliance unattended when in operation.

The training development course represented, however, but a first step in a much larger effort related to food safety across the PASF. Through partnership with the Palestinian Authority's Consumer Protection Association (CPA), our project team, which consisted of Palestinian, PASF, Canadian Logistics personnel, and me as project manager, produced and implemented a needs assessment of PASF food safety that included a focus on kitchen infrastructure, equipment cataloguing, equipment life cycle management, food handling procedures, as well as policy and doctrine related to both training development and logistics, and of course, training. This intersection of training and logistics systems necessarily had to be addressed if the conceptual food safety system was going to be successful. This study identified and documented the areas to be targeted for PASF and international support. It represented a strategic-focused activity that members of the LC could continue to pursue under USSC mentorship for years to come.

So, what is the lesson here? As TDOs, by virtue of the jobs we do, simply relying on our technical expertise in training is insufficient. Organizational success is not reliant on the success of any one system but on the harmonization and intersection of a variety of systems across

organizational and disciplinary boundaries. It is impossible to imagine implementing a training system at the without the assurance (and growth and development, where necessary) of dependent systems. Continuing with the LC example, for food safety training to be successful, its development is dependent upon food safety policy and procedures. PASF food safety policy and procedures are necessarily dependent upon and informed by validated food safety policies and procedures of the Palestine Authority (PA). It is equally impossible to assure a food safety system if the state of equipment and infrastructure cannot support it. The procurement, replacement, and life cycle management of kitchen equipment and infrastructure is dependent (at least for the moment) upon international support. Most importantly, empowering the LC as COE to provide oversight is critical in ensuring that a decentralized program is coordinated and managed by a centralized authority. I am sure you can appreciate that this is no longer a simple training development activity but a major, multidisciplinary project. As TDOs, our knowledge of systems within systems was critical to fully appreciating what at first glance might look like a simple training problem.

There are a few additional lessons here for TDOs

who deploy to support the development of training or training systems. We are particularly good at what we do and often we see issues that few else can. If you wish to add value to your team and the host country that you have the privilege of serving, it is imperative that you seek out the problems where they are and truly understand them. If you think an opening exists (choose your battles wisely), act on it. Do not wait to be told to fix them. Seize the opportunity!

A few final words of wisdom. Be sure to include leadership in the decision-making process. Help them understand the vision and keep them informed of your progress. They are an integral part of the solution and will help you open doors that may otherwise remain closed. TFJ

The enthusiasm that the LC team feels for this project motivates and reassures me and I take comfort knowing that members of the next roto will carry on where we left off. I reflect on the many lessons I

have learned here, the most important being leadership, inspiration, having a vision, remaining flexible, and maintaining a positive attitude. Change happens according to the timetable of those you serve. Inspire them and they will surprise you.

SPCA centre manager completes 236.5 km triathlon for 'Sweat for Pets'

Marianne Carlyle, Manager of the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (Ontario SPCA) Leeds and Grenville Animal Centre in Brockville, completed a 236.5 km triathlon on June 24.

She didn't do this solely to push herself physically; it was also to raise money for the Ontario SPCA's Sweat for Pets annual fundraiser. She collected over \$3,300 by the time she arrived in Pembroke.

"I have surpassed my goal," said Carlyle. "Now I'm aiming for a little more. I put the challenge out for \$5,000 for the end of the campaign."

Ontario-wide, the goal of Sweat for Pets is to raise \$125,000.

Carlyle is no stranger to fitness, and every Thursday during the fundraising campaign, she participated in a different fundraising exercise event. Over the past four weeks, she has cycled almost 400 kilometres, riding between animal centres in Brockville, Napanee and Cornwall, and she also com-

The triathlon was the most gruelling, however, combining all three sports. Starting at Riverside Park in Pembroke at 7 a.m., she swam 1.5 km. She then ran the five km to the Ontario SPCA Renfrew County Animal Centre with the centre's interim manager Kate Graham. Carlyle then cycled the rest of the way home.

A 150 km run over five weeks was Graham's personal challenge, which she fulfilled on Thursday.

"It felt really great to fin-

ish with another centre manager," said Graham. "I've been pretty much doing the whole thing by myself so it is nice camaraderie and linking our two centres together."

Heather Jobe, Community Development Coordinator, has been incredibly impressed by people volunteering their time to raise funds, notably Carlyle's own weekly challenges.

"They've all been pretty impressive and pretty exceptional," said Jobe. "So she is really pushing the limits.

"And she's prepared to do this because these animals need our help," she added, noting Carlyle is an inspiration to all.

Jobe is also pleased to see the generosity and support of the local community. Because even if the centre is open by appointment only, the staff and volunteers are still hard at work.

Sweat for Pets' five-week campaign may have finished officially on June 25, but it's never too late to donate to help animals in your community, said Jobe.

"We need that support and with that support, we can help more animals," she said.

Orange ribbons on Petawawa River Bridge honour residential school children

Sisters Carole Kohoko and Dale Benoit-Zohr have added the Petawawa River Bridge to a growing list of landmarks they have adorned with orange ribbons to honour residential school children - the survivors and those who did not come home.

Started by Kohoko with the bridge at the Algonquins of Pikwakanagan First Nation, the effort has been gaining traction ever since.

"I really never thought it would catch on like it has," said Kohoko.

In the wake of recent news of hundreds of unmarked children's graves at residential schools in Kamloops, BC and Saskatchewan, AB, bridges in Arnprior, Renfrew, and Eganville were also lined with the symbolic coloured ribbons, and the two expect more requests in the future.

"We wanted to put these where people are going to ask, 'What does this mean?' and we can tell our story," explained Benoit-Zohr. "We need to bring awareness to this, and I think the orange will speak for itself."

The orange ribbons highlight Phyllis (Jack) Webstad's story; she was just six when she was given a new orange top by her grandmother to wear for her first day at St. Joseph's Mission residential school in BC. When Phyllis got to school, they took away her clothes, and the orange shirt was never returned.

Webstad is now the Executive Director of the Orange Shirt Society, and tours the country telling her story and raising awareness about the impacts of the residential school system. According to www.orangeshirtday.org, the colour orange has always reminded her of her time at residential school, and the harm it did to her sense of self-esteem and well being.

"We just ask for people to sit and think about this. What if that was your child, what if your child didn't come home, and you didn't know where they were? Put yourself in that situation," said Benoit-Zohr. "Our kids are our future, and every time they find another grave site, we re-live these tragedies. It's going to be a long healing process."

The painful legacy of residential schools is a multi-generational reality for many at Pikwakanagan First Nation. There are those who survived residential school or had loved ones who went, and one family that sadly lost a son, noted Benoit-Zohr.

Thirteen-year-old Joey Commanda ran away from a residential school in Brantford in 1968 and died trying to make it back to his family in Golden Lake. A memorial walk has been organized in his honour this year from August 27-29.

"It's one of the reasons we took this (ribbon project) on personally, because we know that family, we grew up with that family," Kohoko said.

Benoit-Zohr hopes the ribbons will remain on the bridges until the end of September.

September 30 is the newly established National Day for Truth and Reconciliation to commemorate the history and legacy of residential schools. It also marks Orange Shirt Day which pays tribute to Indigenous children who attended residential school, and is a way to show that "Every Child Matters."

Her staff and the people she has met have also been delightful.


"It has been a good area and a good experience so far," said Worobec. "People have been really friendly and welcoming."

Resolution 11 upheld, Pride Flag won't be raised at Petawawa municipal offices

The Town of Petawawa will not fly the Pride Flag this year despite the majority of council voting to change a 23-year old policy.

Four of seven council members voted to discuss changing the resolution governing proclamations and flag-raising during their June 21 meeting, but the motion to review if it should be amended was denied. It must be supported by a two-thirds majority vote of the council members.

A vote to revisit can not be considered more than once in any twelve months, so any chance of changing this resolution will have to wait as per protocol.

The original issue arose after members of the community approached the council on June 7 with the request to fly the flag during Pride Month. They came prepared with a petition of over 640 signatures.

"It's very disheartening that tonight's vote was in favour of amending this outdated bylaw, but because a two-thirds majority was not obtained that this issue can't be revisited for another year," said Jennifer Neville, who had originally approached the council about raising the Pride Flag. "Rest assured that I will be approaching the council again in a year's time to present our LG-BTQ2+ youth and community members."

Deputy Mayor Gary Serviss had moved forward with the Notice of Motion that council reconsider Resolution #11, adopted by Council on February 3, 1998. The resolution states council "declines to declare any public proclamations save those which pertain to matters which are solely and completely within the immediate mandate of council."

"It's now 2021, and our values and our community's values have changed immensely," said Serviss. "I think it's time we revisited this policy and amended it to give council more flexibility for exceptions to be made."

He noted Petawawa is a progressive, welcoming, caring and inclusive community but there is always room for change and improvement.

"Sometimes a small gesture like a proclamation or flag raising goes a long way in demonstrating a commitment to equity and inclusion," said Serviss.

This sentiment was echoed by Councillor James Carmody, who seconded the motion.

"This no proclamation policy is out of step with the times," he said. "And people in society, especially marginalized segments of society or people who have been discriminated against in the past, these people have the right to have their government support them."

"A proclamation says, very loudly and very clearly, we believe, we support, we want, so I think we can look at this policy again," added Councillor Theresa Sabourin.

Councillor Matthew McLean shared the opinion that society is changing and that the town must adapt.

The motion was voted against by Councillor Tom Mohns, who felt that the policy is fine as-is. He felt that it is enough that the town flies the Canadian Flag, the Flag of Ontario and the Flag of Petawawa as these represent all people.

"I see no reason to change," said Councillor Murray Rutz. "It's not about a single issue, but about the process the corporation has in place and that remains in place."

The resolution was last reviewed in 2013. The two-line resolution was seen as simple but fair and remained unchanged.

Regardless of the reason, no matter how noble, any request to fly a flag or make a proclamation has been turned down, said Mayor Bob Sweet, who grappled with the issue over the past weeks.

In a phone interview, he firmly stated turning down this request had nothing to do with the LGBTQ2+ community, but rather the desire to stay neutral and adhere to longstanding regulations.

Over the years, he has been involved in anti-bullying campaigns and wants the town to be seen as an inclusive place for all. It hurts him to think people will feel the town is unwelcoming due to the no-proclamation policy as he views it as fair to everyone since it ensures that no group, organization or cause is seen above the rest.

"We have been consistent with this when it was introduced in 1998," said Sweet.

"It may disappoint many people out there, and I understand that," he added. "We cannot be everything to everybody."


